And then as we get to the end of January and realised we aren't really making any headway or have forgotten what our resolutions were in the first place, we can feel frustrated with ourselves.


But do we have to wait another year, until we can try again?

February 2022

On Wednesday the 2nd February, the focus of the Christian church begins to shift.

On this day we celebrate Candlemas, Jesus being presented in the temple and Simeon on seeing the baby Jesus at just 40 days old, recognising in this infant, just one of many who would have been brought to the temple that day, the One who would be a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for the glory of the people Israel.

From Christmas we have been in a season of light, we have celebrated the birth of the light of the world, Magi, guided by the light of a star have brought their gifts to honour the King of Kings.

In the northern hemisphere, this image of the new light coming, is reinforced for us, by the gradual lengthening of the days, barely perceptible at first, but then, by the middle of January we suddenly notice that at 4.30 it is still light, and each day stretches out just a little bit longer until in March the clocks will spring forward.

Light is such a powerful image in the Christian church, and on Candlemas, as our Christmas/Epiphany season draws to a close, we remember Jesus as a light of revelation to the Gentiles, we remember that Jesus came not just for the few, but too the many, for the whole world.

But as I mentioned earlier, at Candlemas our focus also begins to shift; we turn away, as it were, from the baby born in the manger, and we begin to look ahead to the suffering the adult Jesus is to face.

Each year the length of time before Candlemas and Ash Wednesday varies. It can be as little as a day, but this year, with Easter coming late, it will be exactly four weeks later, on Wednesday 2nd March, that Lent will begin. On Ash Wednesday we will symbolically move into a season of penitence, self-examination and prayerful approach as we journey with Jesus to the foot of the cross on Good Friday, in anticipation of his joyful resurrection on Easter Day. But we can only truly experience Easter if we have embraced that Lenten journey.

As we journey through these coming months, may we be aware of the presence of the Light of Jesus with us, and may we share that light with others in all we say and do.

May God bless you.


SERVICE OF NINE LESSONS AND CAROLS

CHRIS TOPPLE

I had already sent my report to Suzanne when I received a phone call from Chris Topple's daughter. Ann. She told me that, sadly, Chris had died on 14th January. I had known that Chris was really unwell as I had heard from the family at Christmas.

Chris and her husband Brigadier Micky Topple came to Little Horkesley in, I think, the 1980's and soon became regulars at our church. Micky quickly became PCC Secretary and then, on the death of Major General de Havilland, he became churchwarden. Sadly, he died at an early age in 1995. Soon after this Chris decided that she would take on his role as PCC Secretary, a role which she fulfilled with great efficiency until ill-heath in 2014 made her reluctantly relinquish her role. Apart from her role as Secretary she did a great deal of work with our Family Services. She had been a teacher and greatly loved any role which involved children. Her photographic records of Family services are in the vestry. She also cycled in the Ride and Stride for Friends of Essex Churches

Throughout all of the years that she was in Little Horkesley she helped with whatever she was able and supported a number of people when they were in trouble. She moved from the village to a flat in Colchester and it was not until the summer of 2021 that a fall meant that she was hospitalised and subsequently unable to return to her flat. For the past few months, she had been living in Milton Lodge in Colchester where the family say the staff treated her with loving care. I still sent the Church Magazine to her, and Ann said that she looked at the last issue with great interest. Her funeral service will be at our church on February 1st at 12 noon followed by a reception at the Village Hall.

We remember her children, Andrew, Clare and Ann and their families in our prayers.

1st Sept.

However twenty four hours completed in August and eighteen bags filled with litter from various parts of Lexden, West Bergholt and Great Horkesley. The approach to the Littlegarth junction on the A134 was dreadful and filled six bags but the area is now clear!

Bogus Callers/Distraction Burglaries & Rogue Traders

Although it is the elderly that are the most likely victims of these types of crime, that is not always the case, besides if you have elderly relatives or friends you may wish to pass on this advice. You may also have elderly or vulnerable neighbours that you can help protect by watching out for suspicious activity.



It's handy to have list with telephone numbers of your water, gas, electricity, telephone etc suppliers by the phone should you need to make contact at any time.

If you have a caller - <u>STOP</u> - are you expecting anyone, is the back door locked, sometimes while you are at front door someone will slip in the back. Have a look out of a window by the front door and if possible, speak to them first from that window or through the closed door. If you are on your own pretend you are not by calling over your shoulder that you will answer the door. There is no longer a "Water Board or Electricity Board" they now have particular company names so if this is stated that should "ring alarm bells" - <u>CHAIN</u> put the door chain on before you open the door if you are opening it at all to them: <u>CHECK</u> ask for an ID card, if in doubt ring a telephone number from your relevant correspondence from that company to verify the identity (not a telephone number from their ID card as it may be false), **IF IN DOUBT KEEP THEM OUT** and call the police on **999** or if you have a carer alarm activate it and speak to your control room. If you do let someone in your home always make sure **you close the door behind them** that way no one else can get in while you are busy with your visitor.

With most of the utility companies you can now set up a password with them so that when one of their employees calls you can verify that they are genuine, speak to your relevant company.

Rogue traders may call at your door claiming to be qualified trades people offering to do work on your home. These people may claim you need services like repairs to your roof, lawn or fences, your driveways power washed or repaired or replaced, garden services, or waste clearance. They may seem friendly and persuasive but too often they target vulnerable, elderly people.

A genuine trader won't:

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- offer to take you to the bank to withdraw cash for payment.
- insist that you make a decision about work they're offering to do on the spot.
- bully or scare you into doing the work.

It's your doorstep so you can choose if you want work carried out. If you do think you need some work doing:

• Ask a friend for a recommended trader or contact a Trading Standards 'Buy with Confidence' accredited trader <u>www.buywithconfidence.gov.uk</u>.

- Get a number of quotes.
- Get a written estimate detailing exactly what work will be carried out, how much it will cost and what the terms of payment are.
- Take your time to make sure you're happy with what you're undertaking ask a trusted friend/relative for advice.

Word from Wormingford By RONALD BLYTHE 10 FEBRUARY 2017

Ronald Blythe thinks of lamps, and the light that friendship brings

"ENDLESS noon-day, glorious noon-day From the Sun of suns is there." Tho-



mas à Kempis was a German monk who came from a poor village family near Cologne, and belonged to an order called the Brethren of the Common Life.

His life was dedicated to imitating Christ. He lived to be over 90, and wrote some beautiful poems, including "Light's abode, celestial Salem". He is describing a place where light lives. Jesus once called himself "the light of the world".

There is a famous Victorian painting by Holman Hunt, The Light of the World. The original hangs in Keble College, Oxford, and a later version in St Paul's Cathedral; but when some of us were young, copies of it hung everywhere; for it was enormously popular. One hung in my bedroom, but I didn't like it much; the figure was so tall, so strange. It wore a shining robe, carried a shining lantern, and wore two crowns: one of shining gold, and one of thorns. I later discovered that it was painted in a London garden, and that the river that flows in the background is the Thames.

"Lead, kindly Light" was written years before Holman Hunt painted this picture. John Newman was far from home at this time, geographically and spiritually. Have you ever heard of the world going dark because some friend has gone away? You see them off and on, then you return to the house, and all the light which you both helped to create has drained away.

It is not only bereavement that causes this darkening of the scene: it can be the close of a holiday. You feel drained, and pull yourself together, give yourself a drink, and might switch on a favourite programme. The light is almost gone altogether, or dipped. We had oil lamps when we were children, and one of Mother's sayings was that she couldn't bear what she called a dirty light. The lamp, a swan glass chimney, had to be polished and kept bright and the wick properly trimmed so that it didn't flame or go into points. When you carried the lamp from room to room, you turned the wick low so that the draught didn't make the flame blacken the chimney; so the light travelled from room to room, illuminating them and then leaving them black.

Why did Newman write "Lead, kindly Light"? For one reason, he was cast down, as the little holiday party he was with in the Mediterranean was broken up and he was left on his own. He had known that this would happen, because it was all planned, and at a certain point his young friends would go on, and he, the young Anglican clergyman, would make his way back to Oxford.

But no sooner had they left than all kinds of miserable things began to happen. He felt ill; he couldn't get a passage on a boat; and a journey that would take us four hours took him several weeks. He wrote on the way "The night is dark, and I am far from home." The night was dark because he and some other Oxford priests were in doubt whether they were on the right path. Soon after this, they would go into retreat, and he would go to Rome to find what he believed was the source of Christian illumination. He became a Roman Catholic in his searches, and shook off the Church of England. He took its beautiful liturgy into Roman Catholicism, and a marvellous poem, The Dream of Gerontius, about being old, emerged from this remarkable poet.

I think of him in these February days of drifting light, greyness and sudden streaks of sunshine, and the mists and the quietness of the Stour Valley.

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


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Polite Notice
