

Roy died on 6th September and his funeral was held at Nayland church on 17th October. He, along with his late wife Mary, had been attenders at Little Horkesley for over 40 years. They were tremendous and generous supporters of everything that we did for such a long time.

As it was expected that there would be many people at the service it was held at Nayland, where Roy had lived and worked for a number of years. That expectation proved correct as around 475 people attended a service of real celebration for his long life. Roy had been organising his service for many years and his sons, Robert and John, had followed his instructions as closely as they could. It was taken by our friend, Archdeacon James Ridge, at Roy's request, with the prayers being led by the vicar of Nayland, Revd Stephane Javelle. His grand-daughter, Emma, spoke about him along with a message from his grandson, Sam. His friend, Sue Carbutt, read a poem and a farewell letter, written by Roy, was read, speaking of his happy and fulfilled life and thanking those involved in it. There was also eulogy by a friend and James gave the address. Our choir joined Nayland choir to lead the singing.

Afterwards everyone was invited to The Talbooth where again Roy had organised exactly what was on offer and it was a wonderful party, just what he would have wished.

In all it was a fitting tribute to a great and honourable man. We will miss him so much.

Future place of worship

We have been praying for a while for the enovation of the Adventist church building in Caen and the possibility of moving in as a church for

LITTLE HORKESLEY WEATHER September - October 2023 By Adrian Szabo



The summary of the weather conditions for the past couple of months: a record breaking warm September and a wet and unsettled October, especially in the second half.

High pressure influenced the UK's weather for the first half of September. bringing fine, sunny, dry conditions and the most significant spell of warmth since June. From 4th to 10th, the UK experienced a significant heat wave with temperatures exceeding 30°C somewhere in the UK for seven consecutive days: a September record. Temperatures here reached 29.3°C on the 9th and 29.7° C on the 10th of September making this the hottest day of the year (33.5°C at Faversham, Kent on the same day- 2023 UK record). The UK monthly mean temperature was 15.2°C, 2.2°C above the 1991-2020 average making this the UK's equalwarmest September in the series from 1884 (shared with 2006). For England and Wales this was the warmest September on record. Mean temperature in our village was 17.8°C which was nearly 3 degrees warmer than usual. The second half of the month saw an abrupt change to much more unsettled and autumnal conditions with westerly weather bringing Atlantic low-pressure systems and significant rain. Storm Agnes had


very little effect in our area. We recorded 9 rainy days in September with totals (41 mm) close to the usual values for September and a predominant southwesterly air circulation.


October started with warm and sunny days especially in the 6-10th interval (24.4° C reached on the 10th), this is more than 8°C above average for the time of year. This was the most significant spell of October warmth since 2011. Fronts sweeping across the UK from 12th to 13th brought widespread wet and cooler weather to the UK more generally, and a final end to any lingering late summer warmth. On the mornings of the 15th and 16th we recorded the first mild air frosts this autumn. The second half of the month was unsettled and very wet at times. Widespread, prolonged and heavy rainfall from storm Babet from 18th to 21st brought serious flooding problems to many areas, with eastern Scotland worst affected. In Little Horkesley we totalled 20 rainy days, we recorded 61mm of rain (well over an average month's rainfall) on 20th October and a total of 208mm for the whole month making it one of the wettest October on record. For comparison we totalled 53mm of rain in October 2022. Mean temperature for October was 12.9° C. slightly above the multiannual values.


Another interesting statistic is that the Live weather data for Little Horkesley total cumulative precipitation at 31 can be viewed here: (total October 2023 rainfall accumulated in the first 10 months of the year) is about 820mm which is more than double the total amount by the same date last year (380mm).



Funding local parish ministry

Parish Share 2024 explained

How are our churches funded?

People are often surprised to discover that Parish churches are largely funded by voluntary donations and giving.

It is thanks to this generosity that churches can pay for the maintenance and running cost of their buildings, any staff they employ and all their activities.

Funding for ministers such as vicars and their houses comes from Chelmsford Diocese which serves all the Church of England churches in Essex and East London.

But Chelmsford Diocese is reliant on local parish churches to provide most of this funding in the first place through an annual contribution called Parish Share.

So, your local parish church is funded almost entirely by the generosity of worshippers and the local communities they serve.



What does Parish Share pay for?

- Each Parish is asked to make a Parish Share contribution each year.
- The Parish Share is put into the Diocesan General Fund Budget, alongside other money Chelmsford Diocese raises. £16.3m of the £22.2m budget comes from Parish Share (73%)
- The budget is used to resource and support local parish ministry as set out in the diagram below.

Who decides how much each parish is asked to contribute?

Parish Share changed in 2023 following a major parish consultation. The consultation told us that Parish Share should:

- Help parishes to mutually support each other, with those better able to contribute, supporting those less able:
 - Parishes in areas of economic deprivation, those facing the particular challenges of rural ministry and parishes without full time stipendiary (paid) clergy are asked to contribute less than others.
 - Parishes are encouraged to come together with neighbouring churches in their deaneries to discuss whether they can help each other.
- Be transparent and just previously there were inconsistencies in how share was calculated, which caused a sense of injustice. In the new Parish Share Scheme every contribution is calculated using the same transparent formula.

How do churches raise the money they need?

The past few years have been extraordinarily challenging for our parish churches and the communities they serve. As with all charities they continue to be almost entirely dependent on people's generosity. Without giving and donations, most churches would simply not be able to pay their bills and their Parish Share, which means Chelmsford Diocese would not be able to pay for clergy and ministers. We are enormously grateful to those in our churches and local communities who have continued to support their local parish church through this time.

Meeting of the PCC on October 17th, 2023

At the meeting of the PCC, we were sorry to have to record the sad loss of three very important members of Horkesley Little the Church community, namely Roy Chapman, Mary Langstone and Sarah Turner. Thev had all made huae contributions to the life of the Parish and will be sadly missed.

David Lewis as Churchwarden said that the worship of the Church continued as planned with Evensong on most Sundays and Morning service once a month. He had no major issues to report regarding the church fabric. A few minor issues regarding lighting and the sound systems were raised which he will address.

Sally Bramall as Treasurer was not present, but she had reported that income and expenditure were broadly in line with budget. The question of Parish Share for 2024 had been discussed at a meeting of the Deanery at which the total share for our six-parish Benefice had been notified. We agreed that Little

Horkesley would pay a little more than our allocation to provide a measure of support for the other parishes.

The Vicar said that the Patronage issue for the Church had been resolved and Keble College, Oxford is now our Patron. This clears up an issue outstanding since the death of George Reynolds several years ago.

The Vicar also said that the issue of the formalization of the Combined Benefice of the six parishes continued to move forward but that no name had yet been agreed.

We congratulated Emma Barr on her ordination. She kindly agreed to take the service on All Souls Day in Little Horkesley. The Big Celebration for the six parishes held at Mount Bures on August 20th by courtesy of Emma, had been a great success.
